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









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




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# Celebrating 25 YEARS with Artistic Director: Karen Gibbons-Brown

# Karen Gibbons-Brown

Karen Gibbons-Brown's resume contains an impressive list of credentials. She began her early training in Columbia, South Carolina under Ann Brodie, Naomi Calvert and Adolphina Suarez-More. Her early training and performing included ballet as well as modern, jazz, tap and theater dance. She continued her studies at American Ballet Theatre with Maria Swoboda, Michael Lland, Patricia Wilde and Leon Danelian and studied on scholarship at David Howard School of Ballet.

Her professional experiences also include South Carolina Chamber Dance Ensemble, Ballet Celeste, Bristol Ballet and the Theatre Ballet of San Francisco where she recreated Anna Pavlova's roles The California Poppy and The Dragonfly. Other performing highlights include performances at the Spoleto Festival in Charleston, South Carolina, the title role in Cinderella, The Sugar Plum Fairy in The Nutcracker, Swanhilda in Coppelia, Aurora in The Sleeping Beauty and "Spring Waters" pas de deux, an exciting display of partnering created by the great Russian choreographer Asaf Messerer. Ms. Gibbons-Brown considers herself fortunate to have had works created especially for her including solos, Pentimento by Jill Eathorne Barr and the role of Anna in Richard Monroe's work, The Hussar. Throughout her career, she has made numerous guest appearances throughout the United States.

Ms. Gibbons-Brown is known for her work in the classroom and enjoys teaching a variety of dance related subjects including ballet, pointe, repertoire, terminology, dance history, pedagogue and makeup and hair for stage as well as restaging major classical works. She has often been invited to teach guest classes and workshops including in Sicily, Italy, Fontenay le Fleury, France and the prestigious Joffrey San Antonio Workshop under the directorship of her mentor Jeremy Blanton. She received her certification in Labanotation while serving on the faculty of Virginia Intermont College under the direction of Constance Hardinge and served as Ballet Mistress for John McFall as he created his production of The Nutcracker for Atlanta Ballet. In 1985, Ms. Gibbons-Brown founded the Kingsport Guild of Ballet and became Artistic Director of the State of Franklin Dance Alliance at its inception in 1988. Other dance administrative duties include serving on the Tennessee Association Board of Directors in many capacities including as president and serving on the Performing Arts Panel for the Tennessee Arts Commission. She assumed directorship of Fort Wayne Ballet in August of 1998. Other career highlights include Outstanding Dance Artist Award in 1997, serving as a juror for Concours International de Danse Classique in Paris, France in 2000, a 2002 graduate of Leadership Fort Wayne and being listed in Who's Who in the 21st Century. In 2010, a new book authored by renowned choreographer Dean Speer, entitled On Technique, identifies Ms. Gibbons-Brown as among the world's 18 most respected ballet masters, pedagogues and artistic directors. Karen is an ABT® Certified Teacher, who has successfully completed the American Ballet Theatre® Teacher Training Intensive in Pre-Primary through Level 9 of the ABT® National Training Curriculum. Her other full time job is spending time with her husband, Jim, and a sundry of dogs.

# A tale of Two Masters...







# Act I

#### Scene 1: Streets of Verona

Early morning on a street in Verona, a pensive Romeo ignores the maidens seeking his attention. The mood is tense. Servants of the rival Capulet and Montague families begin to fight. The alarm sounds as the violence escalates into a brawl. It is quelled when the Prince of Verona threatens death to those involved in future disturbances.

# Scene 2: House of the Capulets

Servants prepare for a ball at the House of the Capulets. Juliet enters with her nursemaid, who struggles to get her into her gown. The guests arrive, among them the uninvited Romeo, Benvolio, and Mercutio in masks. During a ponderous dance for the knights, Juliet dances with Paris, her intended suitor. She treats him politely and indifferently. Romeo catches sight of her and falls instantly in love, forgetting his unrequited relationship with Rosalind. His closest friend Mercutio enlivens the gathering with a buffoonish dance, after which Romeo and Juliet perform a madrigal. Juliet disentangles herself from Romeo and playfully dashes from the room. Meanwhile, Tybalt recognizes Romeo as a member of the rival Montagues. Tempers flare, and the guests disburse. Juliet returns to the empty hall looking for a kerchief she dropped during her encounter with Romeo.

# Act II

# Scene 1: Streets of Verona

The public square fills with revelers celebrating the carnival season. Cheerful and animated Romeo strolls through the crowd, preoccupied with thoughts of Juliet. Mercutio teases him while a street dance and procession begin. The nursemaid seeks out Romeo at Juliet's behest and, after exchanging humorous bows with Mercutio, gives Romeo a letter from Juliet. Now the couple is secretly betrothed.

# Scene 2: Friar Laurence's chamber

After being sworn to utmost secrecy, Friar Laurence performs the wedding of Romeo and Juliet.

## Scene 3: Streets of Verona

Mercutio and Benvolio enter with their companions. The surrounding street dance suddenly halts when Tybalt bumps up against Mercutio, precipitating a confrontation. Romeo, fresh from Friar Laurence's, tries in vain to restore calm, but a duel ensues, and Mercutio is killed. Romeo resolves to exact revenge and battles fiercely with Tybalt and slays him. Recalling the Prince of Verona's edict, Benvolio wraps Romeo in a cloak and urges him to flee.

# Act III

# Scene 1: Juliet's Bedchamber

Romeo, about to escape Verona for Mantua, bids farewell to Juliet in the predawn haze. Upon his departure, the nursemaid warns Juliet that her parents have come to see her with Paris. Juliet weeps as her father orders her to marry the suitor.

## Scene 2: Friar Laurence's Chamber

Juliet turns to Friar Laurence for help, who suggests she feign her death with a sleeping potion. Once everyone believes her dead, Romeo can spirit her away to Mantua where the two may live in peace.

# Scene 3: House of the Capulets/Juliet's bedchamber

Juliet informs her parents that she will marry Paris the next day. With wedding preparations underway, she takes the potion and falls into a deep sleep in her bedchamber. Paris presents a gift-bearing retinue, with which he intends to greet Juliet before dawn. The gifts include an emerald, carpets, and exotic contraband goods. On the morning of her wedding, Juliet's bridesmaids discover her and believe her dead.

# Scene 4: The Crypt

Romeo, believing Juliet dead, comes out of exile to mourn at her grave. He finds Paris at the crypt, fights, and kills him. In despair, Romeo lies down beside his love and drinks a deadly poison. At last, Juliet awakens. Finding her lover dead, she uses his dagger to join him in eternity.

## ANDREW CONSTANTINE

Andrew Constantine began his musical studies on the cello. His first studies were with John Carewe and Norman Del Mar in London and later with Leonard Bernstein at the Schleswig-Holstein Music Festival in Germany. At the same time, he founded the Bardi Orchestra in Leicester. With this ensemble he performed throughout Europe and the UK and had his first taste and experience of conducting an enormous range of the orchestral repertoire.

A British Council scholarship took Constantine to the Leningrad State Conservatory in 1991 where he studied with the legendary pedagogue Ilya Musin. He cites Musin as being the strongest influence on his conducting, both technically and philosophically. His Royal Festival Hall debut in 1992 with the London Philharmonic was met with unanimous critical acclaim and praise.

In 2004, he was awarded a highly prestigious British NESTA Fellowship to further develop his international career. This was also a recognition of Constantine's commitment to the breaking down of barriers that blur the perceptions of classical music and to bringing a refreshed approach to the concert-going experience. This is a commitment that he has carried throughout his work and which continues with his advocacy for music education for all ages.

Another project created by Constantine geared towards the 'contextualizing' of composers' lives is The Composer: REVEALED. In these programs the work of well-known composers is brought to life through the combination of dramatic interludes acted out between segments of chamber, instrumental and orchestral music, culminating with a complete performance of a major orchestral work. The year 2015 saw the debut of Tchaikovsky: REVEALED.

In 2004, Andrew Constantine was invited by the great Russian maestro Yuri Temirkanov to become Assistant Conductor of the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra. Within a year he became Associate Conductor and has enjoyed a wonderful working relationship with the orchestra since that time.

In 2007 he accepted the position of Music Director of the Reading Symphony Orchestra in Pennsylvania – after the RSO considered over 300 candidates - and helped the orchestra celebrate its 100th Anniversary as they continue to perform to capacity audiences. In addition, in 2009 he was chosen as the Music Director of the Fort Wayne Philharmonic from a field of more than 250 candidates.

He has worked with the Buffalo Philharmonic, Rochester Philharmonic, Syracuse Symphony, Jackson-ville Symphony, Chautauqua Festival Orchestra and Phoenix Symphony, among others. Again, critical acclaim has been hugely positive, the press review of his Phoenix debut describing it as "the best concert in the last ten years."
